President's Message

Greetings WGLHA. Haven't we had some unusual weather lately? As I'm writing this, I'm looking out on 3 inches of snow with more expected tonight. I just came from the dam where lots of kids are enjoying their day off from school, sledding on the slope and throwing snow balls.

Some of you may be wondering when the spillway project (and the lake lowering) will get underway. Well, the best I can give you at this time is we still don't know. You've seen the weather! We are in a serious el Nino weather pattern and I don't know when it's going to stop. So, we continue to wait. As I mentioned in the last newsletter, here's what needs to happen for the project to get underway: 1) the spillway needs to be mostly clear of water draining from the lake so we don't have to pay extra to pump it out; 2) the three pumps need to be available and operational; 3) the 10-day weather forecast needs to show little or no rain; and 4) the contractor needs to be ready to start once the lake is lowered. In addition, the temperature needs to be above 35° for pouring concrete. It's very difficult to have everything in alignment at the same time. But, it will happen. We just have to be patient. I am in touch with the dam inspectors, the engineer and the contractor on a regular basis. The dam inspectors even came by in early January to check things out. They said the spillway is holding up ok. Maybe we can get something going this spring...

We had a Holiday Decorating Contest on December 18th and 153 homes participated! Our coordinator, Barry Ledbetter, was so pleasantly surprised with the results. Thank you so much, Barry, for getting this going for us. Looks like it was a big success. Inside you can read more about it and see who the winners were.

The Annual Meeting is scheduled for Thursday, March 4th. We will, of course, be electing officers and alternates for the Board. We have three new volunteers who are running for the Board this time. Look inside to read about all of our prospective Board members and please plan to come to the meeting. It is a great opportunity to see what we have accomplished during the past year. We also look forward to hearing any suggestions that you might have for what could be done this coming year.

I have one more thing I would like to write. I want to thank Tricia Siano who graciously puts together our newsletter. She does a wonderful job and I am so grateful for her assistance. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Jeanie Velarde who is our bookkeeper. She is our backbone and keeps everything running so smoothly. Thank you Jeanie!

I look forward to seeing you at our events and around the neighborhood.

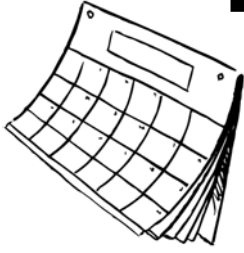

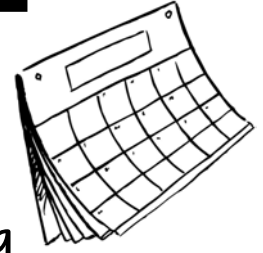

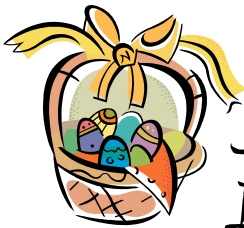

Lake Report & Regulations

The Lake Committee is planning to do a clean-up when the lake is lowered. We will give notice when the clean-up is actually scheduled and will welcome any and all volunteers.

In regards to fishing, my personal feeling is that the fish population is out of balance with too many bass and too few of all other species but there was really no consensus on this matter within the Lake Committee. The only way to resolve this matter quickly would be to sample the lake and there would be some cost to do this. In another year or two, however, if the population of crappie and bream continues to decline, the matter will resolve itself because the problem will become evident. There are some people out here who don't particularly like to fish for just bass but, at this time, this about all you can catch.

The lake looks real good as far as clarity is concerned but we have a potential problem with mud being carried into the lake from the runoff from Lovitt Field. We wouldn't have a problem if we could keep kids in 4WD pickups from rutting up the area after rains. I'm sure it's a lot of fun but it is destructive. Parents, we hope you will talk with your children who have these vehicles and ask them not to use them in Lovitt Field.

Keep our Neighborhood Clean!

If you haven't done so already, please remove the leaves from your yards and don't forget the leaves in the gutters! And when it comes to garbage, be aware of this City of Memphis Code:

It is a violation to accumulate junk, trash and other debris on residential property. This includes, but is not limited to discarded items, auto parts, appliances, furniture, building materials, tires, paper, cardboard, plastics, or dead limbs or branches. All garbage should be disposed of by putting it in the proper container and placing it for collection at the appropriate location and time. It is also a violation to allow trash carts to remain on the curb following pick-up.

With this in mind, please do not leave your trash or yard waste at the curb except the day before or morning of garbage pick-up. Once your containers have been emptied, remove them from the street as soon as possible. Following our City Codes will help enormously in making our neighborhood look its best.

WGL Winter Wildlife

I love seeing deer tracks in the snow. Memphis has been home to me my entire life, but I never saw this phenomenon until I bought a house on Walnut Grove Lake. It's just one more thing I love about living here. Our neighborhood is like an oasis, seemingly miles from the thunder of Germantown Parkway traffic.

Winter has its own appeal, especially with a white blanket. Over the summer, deer came through our yard almost every day, but I hadn't seen them in a while and wondered if they moved when the cold weather hit. In fact, I've always wondered where they sleep and what they do during icy weather. Thanks to the February 8th snow, I found out they're still quite active. We woke that morning to find three separate sets of deer tracks in the snow in our front yard.



The birds always bring the biggest joy to me during the winter months. My husband and I re-stock our bird feeder and suet feeder frequently and we're rewarded with some beautiful visitors. For some reason, I never see the bluebirds until we have snow. I guess they stand out best against a white background and with all of our recent snow, I've seen them quite often. One of my favorite birds is the red-bellied woodpecker like the one in this picture. I love how the sun lit his red head against the icy background.

January's frigid temperatures brought about a rare sight for residents of our neighborhood ~ a solid frozen lake surface. I asked around and found that this hasn't happened very often. I couldn't wait to get up each morning and check to see if it was still frozen. Leaves blew across the surface and big, heavy geese walked on top. I watched as ducks landed and slid and as you can see in this picture, one goose cracked the ice as he landed while his buddy strutted along on top.



Just because it is wintertime doesn't mean the animals are off hibernating. Margie McMillan tells me that Bob and Laura Marchini woke up to a strange sight in early January. They saw two red fox fast asleep in their backyard.

Now it's your turn. I'd love to hear your wildlife stories or see your pictures. Who knows, they might even appear in the next issue of the newsletter. And I'd also like to throw out a challenge. As much as I like squirrels, (we even throw out dried corn cobs for them) I don't like to see them on my bird feeder. I attempted to create a homemade squirrel baffle out of a two-liter soda bottle, but it only took the squirrels a few days to figure out how to jump around it. So, do you have a better solution? I look forward to hearing from you.

REMINDER:

**All Outside Construction Must Be Approved First by
WGLHA Board**

Everyone should have a copy of our covenants. If you don't have a copy, you can download it from our web site or call our phone number and we will get you a copy. Item D.4. states, "All plans and specifications for new or future construction of every type, including buildings, piers, fences, driveways, and walls, shall be approved in writing before construction by Walnut Grove Lake Homeowners Association, Inc., or their authorized representative." You can also download a copy of our Construction Approval Form from the web site.

Railroad ties or other toxic materials will not be allowed to be used in Walnut Grove Lake at all, for anything. Even for replacement of any rotten railroad ties in a seawall. A TDEC permit should accompany any application to the WGLHA Board if you are planning to build or replace a dock, ramp or sea wall. Contact Lew Hoffman at Lew.Hoffman@tn.gov.

Even though railroad ties are no longer acceptable, we don't want to discourage anyone from building or repairing a seawall. Those properties that don't have seawalls are slowly eroding into the lake, adding to the silt accumulation and decreasing the size of their properties. So, please consider shoring up your shore line, if you don't have a seawall.

FIRST CLASS
